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### DNR wildland firefighters in Texas to help suppress massive fires

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#### *Texas fires have consumed more than one million acres*

On the morning of Monday, May 2, Trent Marty, chief of the Forest Protection Section, reported that DNR's "equipment and personnel arrived safely in Texas Sunday." The Division of Forestry had received a request for assistance on April 28, and the next day Gov. Scott Walker issued a [news release](#) announcing that Wisconsin would be sending firefighting equipment and personnel to the Longhorn state.

Specifically, the department sent a "heavy dozer, four complete heavy units and a type 6 engine, with a strike team leader and a strike team leader trainee," said Division of Forestry administrator and state forester Paul DeLong. He summed up the situation in Texas as "beyond comprehension, with more than 1.5 million acres having burned in the past few weeks."

Forty-three states and the Virgin Islands have been fighting back the flames of several Texas fires, fanned by high winds and re-ignited by lightning strikes. A prolonged drought combined with unsafe debris burning and sparks from equipment have been blamed for the initial start of the fires.

"The state requesting the aid pays all expenses associated with the aid including equipment transport, operation, and maintenance and all salary and fringe costs for staff accompanying the equipment," read the governor's news release.

In making a decision to provide assistance, the Forestry Leadership Team stated that its priority is to meet "Wisconsin forestry workload objectives" this year.

DeLong enumerated the factors that went into his program's decision to lend a hand:

- Wisconsin has had a strong state-to-state partnership with Texas over the years in assisting each other during times of need.
- The immediate and long-term prognosis of the fire situation in Texas is dire.
- So far this year, Wisconsin has experienced unprecedented below-normal temperatures and above-normal precipitation, keeping fire danger low.
- The short-term weather forecast for Wisconsin indicates continued cool and moist conditions.
- Forestry's leadership team evaluated progress made on its priority workload

objectives, determining that the program is, for the most part, on target to meet those objectives.

- The team identified a couple of potential workload concerns and committed to assuring that this work is accomplished, even if it means reallocating resources around the state.
- The Texas fires will provide key required experience and training to staff.

"Texas has come to our aid in previous years during drought-related active fire seasons in Wisconsin," DeLong explained. "It's great to be able to return the favor and continue our very beneficial mutual aid relationship."

**"There has been an overwhelmingly positive response from the municipalities, the Oneida Tribe and Brown County. Everyone wants a "Packer" tree planted in their community," said Tracy Salisbury, DNR urban forestry specialist in Green Bay.**

With a tremendously successful first year, the Packers have agreed to fund First Downs for Trees for the upcoming football season.

The goal is to help reduce the 450 tons of carbon emitted by the Packers' air charters

to regular season road games.

The Green Bay Packers and Wisconsin Public Service Corp. approached Northeast Region's urban forestry staff Salisbury and **Olivia Witthun** (now the regional urban forestry coordinator in the Southeast Region) about donating and planting trees in an effort to reduce the team's carbon footprint.

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**The Bureau of Technology Services (BTS) is gearing up to move the department's computer network users to the next generation in desktop services, Microsoft Windows 7 and Office 2010.**

**The Windows 7/Office 2010 Project Team has steadily moved forward developing project plans to migrate all desktop, laptop and tablet devices (PTD, personal technology devices) from Windows XP/Office 2003 to Windows 7/Office 2010.**

**"Microsoft Windows 7/Office 2010 product suites installed on servers and PTDs offer efficiencies in managing DNR's complex network of servers, computers, PTDs and printers," said Richard Doty, director of the Bureau of Technology Services. "The agency also should see some cost savings as we deploy and implement new feature offerings."**

**Deployment of Windows 7/Office 2010 is tentatively scheduled to begin on**

**July 1, with completion projected to occur by December 30.**

#### **Test lab and training available to make transition smooth**

In preparation for the migration, BTS has designed and opened a test lab, located in room G11 in GEF II, where all machine models, DNR developed software applications and third party software packages are being tested. BTS staff and the programs' information technology coordinators (ITCs) continue to work with employees to complete this process.

"We've identified a number of ways to deliver training to users," said Doty. "Desktop training tools will be available to make the transition easier."

### **Governor nominates board members to six year terms**

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*Upon confirmation, will represent agriculture, hunting and business*

Gov. Scott Walker has announced three appointees to the [Natural Resources Board \(NRB\)](#). If confirmed, these appointees will represent the farm, hunting and business communities.

Wisconsin Farm Bureau President William Bruins, Wisconsin Hunters' Rights Coalition co-founder Greg Kazmierski, and Shawano businessman Terry Hilgenberg have been nominated to serve six-year terms. The Wisconsin NRB sets policy for the DNR. "Everyone in Wisconsin has a stake in our natural resources – for recreation, for quality of life or business. It's critical that the state Natural Resources Board represent all our interests when it makes tough decisions about managing our

environment. I'm confident these people will help make sure that happens," said Gov. Walker.

**William Bruins**, Waupun, owns and operates the Homeland Dairy family farm in rural Fond du Lac County. Since 2003, he's served as president of the Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation, the state's largest general farm organization with more than 22,000 members. Since 2010, he also has served on the Waupun Area Board of Education. Bruins has been a member of the UW-Madison College of Agricultural and Life Sciences Board of Visitors and has been involved in a number of agricultural stewardship committees.

**Gregory Kazmierski**, Mukwonago, is the owner and operator of Buck Rub Outfitters, Ltd., an archery range and retail store in Pewaukee. He grew up on a Wisconsin dairy farm in Mukwonago, and in the 1970s he was a licensed well driller. Kazmierski is a co-founder of the Wisconsin Hunters' Rights Coalition, current president of the Safari Club International Dairyland Committee of the Wisconsin Chapters, and is a former Wisconsin Bowhunters Association board member and chapter president.

**Terry Hilgenberg**, president of the family-run Hilgenberg Realty with offices in Shawano and Green Bay, has had a 35-year career in real estate marketing, development and investment. He is the past vice chairman of the Wisconsin state Real Estate Board, past regional vice president of the National Association of Realtors and past president of the Wisconsin Realtors Association. Hilgenberg has been active in Shawano local service groups including Rotary, Optimist and Chamber of Commerce, and contributed to rewriting the Shawano County Shoreland Zoning and Animal Waste and Disposal ordinances.

Bruins, Kazmierski and Hilgenberg replace outgoing NRB chair **Jonathan Ela** and members **Gary Rohde** and **John Welter**, whose terms expired on May 1.

The new appointees are expected to attend the next NRB meeting set for May 24-25 in Madison.

Chapter 15 of the Wisconsin Statutes delineates the formal duties of the seven-member board. The governor appoints the board members, with the advice and consent of the State Senate. Three members must be selected from the northern and southern portions of the state and one member serves at large. Terms expire on May 1.

## Spring sturgeon spawning: the pictures tell it all

- **Deer Farm Investigation:** John Windt of Pence, and Matt MacKenzie and Dave Oginiski, both based in Ashland, all played key roles in handling an unprecedented potential chronic waste disease situation involving deer escapes from a roughly 900-acre deer farm with faulty fencing. The wardens worked with surrounding landowners, as well as wildlife biologists, to resolve the situation that ended with final tests showing no disease.

- **Felony Mistreatment of Animals Case:** Amie Egstad and Pat Quaintance, both based in Bayfield, completed a thorough investigation of a case of felony mistreatment of animals causing death that led to jail time for the suspect along with penalties that included license revocations, probation and fines.

The case is pending and involves possible revocation of fishing privileges.

#### ***South Central Region***

- **Overall Law Enforcement Program:** **Nathan Kroeplin**, based in Dane County, for his successful development of a well-balanced program of enforcement, education, community involvement in conservation, and teamwork with fellow wardens statewide.
- **Chief's Cup Awards:** **Paul Nell**, Horicon, was recognized for his investigations of violations in the septic hauling business that led to filing six charges in Dodge County. **Nick Webster**, Monroe, for his exceptional work with the snowmobile program, including assisting stranded motorists during the February 2011 blizzard.

#### ***Northeast Region***

- **Marijuana Grow Investigation:** **Joe Paul**, based in Lakewood, worked with county, state and federal authorities to break an illegal marijuana plant operation, leading to arrests and the subsequent eradication of about 25,000 plants.
- **Amberg Bank Robbery:** **Dave Oginski Jr.**, based in Wausaukeee, kept a calm demeanor while bird-dogging a suspected bank robber's vehicle until it was safe to make a high-risk felony stop with a Crivitz officer, only 12 minutes after the robbery.
- **Deer Research Award:** **Mark Schraufnagel**, stationed in Shawano, for contacting every landowner in several townships in the Eastern Farmland Area to secure 85 approvals to conduct DNR deer research, and for assisting the research project's helicopter crew to identify approved private property areas and those off limits.
- **Thrill Kill Case:** **Andy Lundin** and **David Allen**, both stationed in Green Bay, and Bob Stroess of Manitowoc, followed a tip about a wildlife killing competition that resulted in the arrest and penalties against 12 males in two counties.
- **Carbon Monoxide Poisoning Rescue:** **Mike Neal**, stationed in Baileys Harbor, upon hearing radio transmissions from the Door County sheriff's department, started life-saving measures on two unconscious individuals found on the ice. Neal, with the help of a local fishing guide, loaded the two into a truck

and got them to shore and a waiting ambulance. Both survived.

- **Charter Boat Arson Investigation:** **Ryan Volenberg**, based in Mishicot, helped crack a case involving a series of boat fires at Kewaunee Harbor by arranging an interview with an informant and the state Department of Criminal Investigations.
- **Thunderbird Game Farm Case:** **Steve Daye**, conservation warden based in Green Bay, collaborated with a U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Agent on a two-year investigation to build a strong case against a long-time habitual violator of wildlife regulations. The suspect is facing charges in state and federal courts.

#### *Southeast Region*

- **Overall Award:** **Mark Pearce**, stationed in Plymouth, for handling nearly 200 hotline issues and complaints while keeping the “Harmony in the Woods” initiative front-and-center in Sheboygan County and maintaining a community profile with volunteer instructors.
  - **Captive Animal Investigation:** Milwaukee-based wardens **Nick Blankenheim**, **Gervis Myles** and **Steve Sanidas** and **Rick Reed** of Waukesha assisted the Milwaukee Police Department in a sexual assault case turned animal hoarder situation involving hundreds of amphibians and reptiles, including numerous endangered alligators and crocodiles. The wardens were charged with the responsibility for and physical removal of these animals.
  - **Diversity Learn to Hunt Pheasants:** **Gervis Myles**, Milwaukee, and **Dave Holmes**, Poynette, collaborated to organize the hunt for inner-city Milwaukee children, their teachers and mentors.
  - **Marijuana Grow on State Land:** **Mike Clutter**, Plymouth, took the lead with a multi-agency response to two marijuana sites in the Kettle Moraine State Forest that led to the arrest of two suspects at gunpoint. Clutter also is leading an effort to train a dog to detect marijuana on the stem.
  - **Culture Bridge in Multiple Gun-Deer Season Violations:** **Bob Lee**, based in Plymouth, responded to a trespassing complaint involving several hunters in search of turkeys. Lee met with the suspects from out-of-country around the kitchen table, under the pretense of explaining Wisconsin hunting rules once he realized they had no knowledge of state laws or hunter education requirements. Even though he ultimately did issue some citations, Lee gained new allies by using community warden principles to gain compliance by treating these individuals with respect and compassion.

- **Eagle Tornado:** **Michael Hirschboeck** of Racine; **Juan Gomez** of Kansaville; and **Mitch Groenier** and **Doug Zeihen**, both of Waukesha, responded quickly to Eagle, shortly after a devastating tornado ravaged the area. The wardens searched for missing residents and used all-terrain vehicles to stop armed looters from threatening property owners.
  - **2010 Snowstorm:** **Michael Hirschboeck** of Racine, **Randy Dunkel** of Sturtevant, **Nick Blankenheim** of Milwaukee and **Doug Zeihen** of Waukesha rushed to aid stranded motorists and State Patrol troopers trapped by the winds and blowing snow on the interstate when Racine, Kenosha and Walworth

counties were slammed by 27 inches of snow in nine hours.

- **Racine/Kenosha Tornado:** Michael Hirschboeck of Racine, Juan Gomez of Kansasville, Randy Dunkel of Sturtevant and Jason Roberts of Sugar Creek rushed into action after a fall tornado raced across Walworth, Racine and Kenosha counties, downing power lines in the path of homebound commuters, trapped residents in their homes, and toppled semitrailer trucks traveling the interstate.

## Three new DNR-related bills introduced; NRB nominees named

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In addition to the introduction of a bill in the Assembly and two in the Senate, Gov. Scott Walker nominated three new members to the Natural Resources Board. The Senate Natural Resources and Environment Committee is expected to vote on their confirmation in the near future. - **AB 104** (Rep. Daniel LeMahieu) requires that at least one Natural Resources Board member have an agricultural background and that at least three members hold hunting, fishing or trapping licenses.
- **SB 75** (Sen. Terry Moulton) sets parameters for deer hunting seasons.
- **SB 77** (Sen. Joe Leibham) expands the membership of the State Trails Council to eleven members.

The Joint Committee on Finance continues voting on the 2011-2013 Budget.
